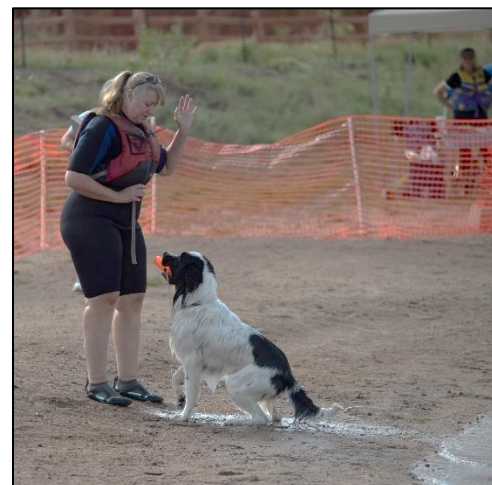

She Is A Multipurpose Dog

TONGUE IN CHEEK?

When you bring to mind an image of a Newf, what are the key characteristics in your image? When you see a Newfoundland on the street, what is a clincher that makes you certain that the dog is indeed a Newf? What makes a Newfoundland dog's face friendly, letting everyone know that she is a kind dog? Would a Newfy be a Newfy without his tongue lolling out?

When Cladina's first-born puppy, Bumble, had only her face out of the birth canal, Consie and I could see through her chorion (birth sac) that she had her tongue out. Bumble's muzzle was short and stubby, but there was a wide pink tongue visible between her lips. Had we not known that this puppy being born was a Newfoundland dog that tongue would have given it away.

Writing seriously about Newfy tongues is just about

impossible. How can a dog, sitting slouched over on one hip with its tongue hanging out be a serious dog? Yet, a relaxed tongue that hangs out, often draped over a canine tooth, is a notable characteristic of the breed. Many paintings dating back to the early 1800s, show Newfs with tongues extended. As soon as photographs of Newfs appeared, many showed Newfs with tongues hanging. The visible tongue appears to have been a breed characteristic from the beginning.

My subjective opinion is that our breed has experienced selective breeding for dogs that make us happy, that make us smile and especially that make us laugh. Clearly, Newfies enjoy making their people laugh. I cannot count the times that one of our dogs has done something goofy and comes up smiling, pleased to have put me in a good mood. Perhaps, our dogs have inherited their hang-me-down (in a good way) tongues because no one can look at a Newfy with its tongue hanging out and not be, at least, a little bit amused.

Newfy tongues differ physically from the tongues of dogs of most other

breeds. Consie and I have good friends who have loved their German shepherds. When their dog, Loki's tongue was visible, which only happened when he was panting, it was stiff, sticking straight out of his mouth a little ways. When I was a kid, I had an uncle and aunt who had dachshunds. Those dogs' tongues were stiff when they panted. I grew up with collies and their tongues are like the tongues of German shepherds and dachshunds. Newfy tongues are thin, supple and relaxed, and those tongues drape luxuriously. John and Myra Lanier, breeders from the 1970s, had a Landseer named Chief whose tongue seemed longer than normal and was always visible. Often, it hung way out of his mouth to one side or the other. John and Myra's kids would try to keep Chief's tongue inside his mouth so that it would not show. They would hold Chief's mouth shut, wrapping his lips and flews around his muzzle. They would roll up his tongue and then clamp his mouth over it. Chief's tongue would always sneak out someplace, first just the tip, then the rest of the tongue following. His tongue was capable of shape shifting. It was as though his tongue became liquified as it

sought a way to escape from his mouth, then returned to tongue form as it became visible between his lips.

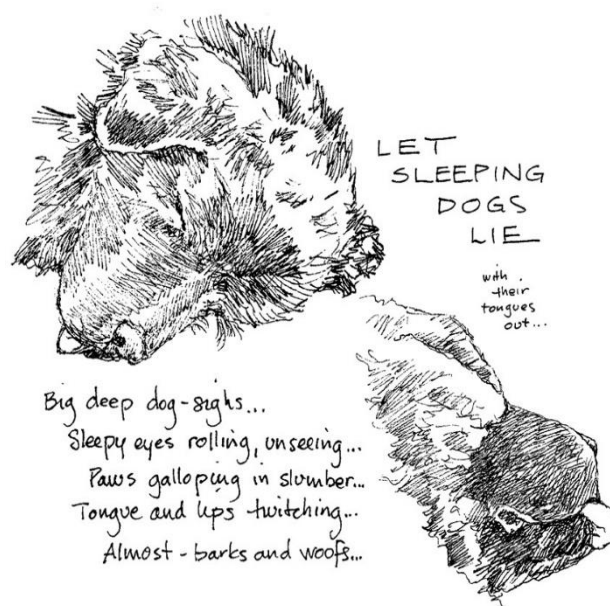
Our girl Milakokia used to sleep with her tongue out, sometimes hanging out two inches. Exposed this way, her poor tongue would get dry, so that when she awoke, Milakokia would smack her chops, moving her tongue so that it could soak moisture from all around the inside of her mouth. She would also sit in front of a fireplace or wood stove, making her face hot, all the while with her tongue out. She would sometimes wipe her face with a paw, as though to get some relief from the heat. Yet, there she would sit, with her face getting hotter and hotter, and her tongue getting drier and drier. When she reached her threshold, she would roll her tongue around inside her mouth, getting it moist again.

All-breed books, which usually feature one page of information including a photograph per breed, never mention tongues. I have not done a thorough review but the United States, Canadian, United Kingdom and Danish breed standards, including old standards, do not mention Newfy tongues. Breed books going back to Kitty Drury's "This is the Newfoundland" and Margaret Booth Chern's "The Complete Newfoundland" and her "The New Complete Newfoundland" do not mention tongues, despite dozens of pages of photos showing dogs with tongues draped at the fronts (or sides) of their mouths. Birgitte Gothen's two editions of her Danish book, "Bogen om Newfoundlandshunden" ("The Book on Newfoundland Dogs"), do not mention tongues, though each book boasts three Newfs on its cover (each with two blacks and one Landseer Newf) with tongues hanging proudly; the Landseer on the first edition has his tongue drooping way out to the side from the back of

his mouth. The entry "tongue" is not to be found in that book's index, nor in any other book index I checked.

So, what is the deal? Newfy tongues are clearly not invisible. Is the tongue, drooping like pink Silly Putty®, so common, so familiar, that we simply fail to see it even when looking right at it? That is what I suspect is the case. Appreciate your dog's tongue for what it shows you about her sweet personality, his bit of goofiness and their abilities not to take themselves too seriously.

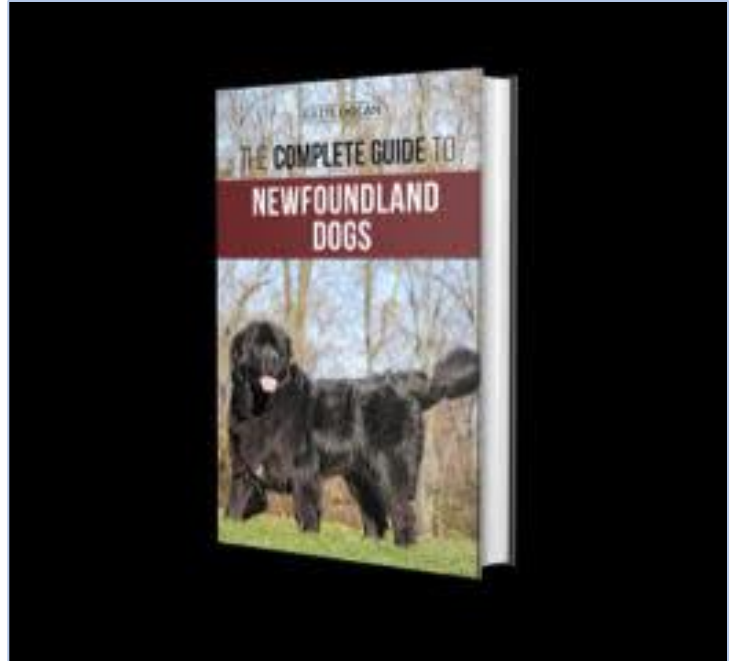
And give each a hug from me.

"We are extremely proud of our CATS program and grateful for all the volunteers who donate their time to bring joy to our passengers and employees," said DEN CEO Phil Washington. "The continued growth of the program is a testament to the positive impact it has on travelers, and we look forward to welcoming even more teams as we continue to grow this beloved program."

The CATS program began on Oct. 29, 2015, on National Cat Day, with 28 members from 14 breeds. Today, the program includes 84 members and 33 breeds as well as one cat (and of course, their human handlers). Despite a "paws" during the pandemic, the CATS program has resumed with teams donating more than 1,250 hours of time so far in 2022.

The program is designed to provide stress relief and delight passengers, making traveling a little less ruff. Their adorable faces and wagging tails provide travelers with memorable moments and smiles through a furry cuddle or pet. Passengers can encounter them throughout DEN sporting their distinctive violet plaid "Pet Me" vests. All CATS are registered with a

recognized pet therapy association and are trained and insured. CATS volunteer handlers wishing to apply with their pet must have experience working with a recognized animal therapy organization and must be registered with the Alliance of Therapy Dogs or Pet Partners. Sadly, I report the loss of Linda Morley-Roser. She was a giant in our club and was an Honorary Member of HCNC. She mentored countless numbers of Newfoundland owners. She will be missed, as her footprint was large in the Colorado Newfoundland community.

Linda bred under the Legacy Newfoundland kennel name. Her contributions to the breed were numerous. Her dog "Wheeler Dealer" was Best of Breed (Owner handled) twice at the Newfoundland National Specialty. He also earned the Versatile Newfoundland Title. "Lucas" was a Top 20

Newfoundland for several years. He was NCA Top Producing Sire several years ago. Notably for me, he was my Daley's grandfather. Others in our club (and beyond) could share boundlessly about the dogs they adopted from Linda.

Linda was intricately involved in leading and chairing HCNC Rescue efforts. This is such a thankless job. I have met multiple people who conveyed that Linda was so caring about the dogs during their transition to their soon to be families. She helped me place a dog of an HCNC member who passed away and the couple that adopted her loved Linda so. It spoke volumes to me.

Linda was also heavily involved in NCA working events. My understanding is she was previously a water and draft judge. (This was before my time in Colorado.) To be a judge takes so much time and commitment to earning titles on your own dogs – and then sharing your knowledge at the judge level. I also understand that Linda had one of (if not the) first Newfoundland ("Tundra") to earn the AKC Utility Title (UD.) Linda's is a truly remarkable and fitting "Legacy."

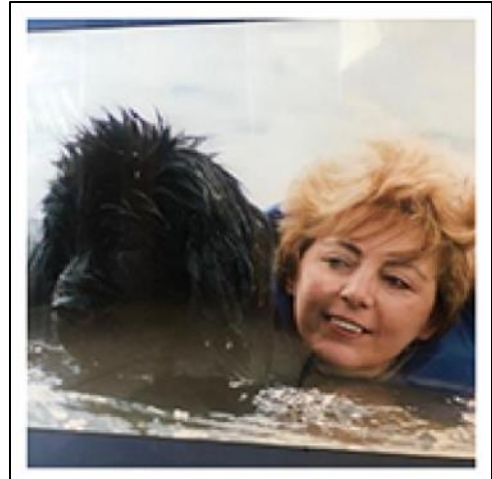

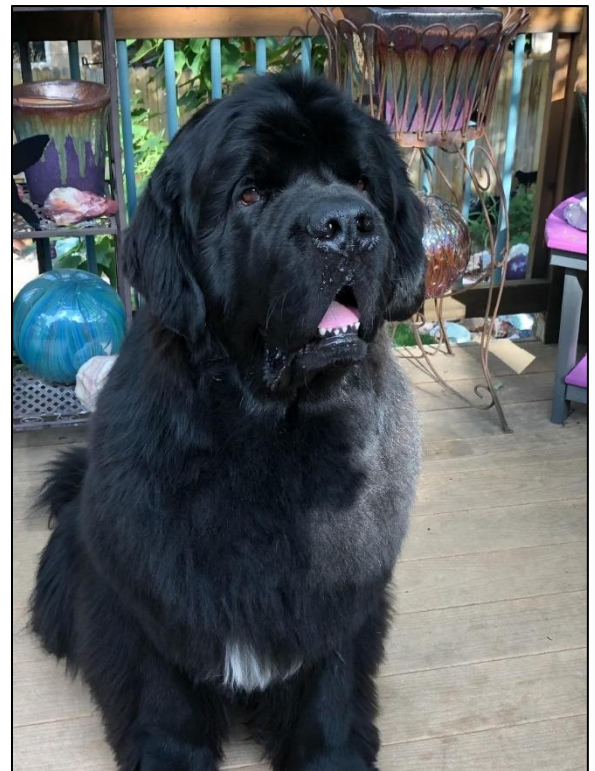

Just a little warning regarding the Xmas treats many stores are now starting to stock for dogs at Xmas

Many of these so-called treats end up with the dog "enjoying" some time in a veterinary surgery over Christmas.

The vast majority of these rawhide products and treats come from China. The chews are made from cattle or horse hides and their journey starts with the hides being soaked in a toxic sodium sulfide to remove the hair and fat. More chemicals are used in order to split the hide into layers which is then washed with hydrogen peroxide to give the white "pure" look and remove the rancid smell.

Now comes the pretty festive colors and the glue to form cute shapes. On testing, these chews have shown traces of arsenic, mercury, chromium and formaldehyde.

If that wasn't bad enough, they regularly cause intestinal blockages, poisoning from chemical residue and choking.

The chews go slippery when wet and are near impossible to get hold of to save a choking dog.

Leave them in the shop where they belong or if some well-meaning person buys them for your dog, put them safely away for later, then dispatch in the bin! Please be safe with your dogs!

Let's Wrap It Up:

While 2022 is not yet in the books, so to speak, I've been reflecting on how I included my dogs in my life over the past 11 months. Of course, I wish I had done more, but surely waking up before the summer temperature reached 80 degrees to take my dogs on their walk in the neighborhood must count for something. I also recollect weekend drives into the mountains with them, again to escape the Denver heat. I recall treating them to paddleboard rides on Lake Dillon and Chatfield Lake with their favorite buddy, Me. Yet my conscience still nags at me that I should have spent more time with them.

I remember the variety of opportunities that both HCNC and our National Newfoundland Club of America (NCA) made available to our membership.
